The original 640A was special, but the boffins at Cambridge have now taken the performance at this price point to a completely new stratosphere.

The 640AV2.0 delivers music within a breathtaking, crystal-clear soundstage. Whatever your musical vice, this amp will oblige, providing insight and inspiration.

Sound quality that'll have you in a spin

Spin The Battle, from the Gladiator OST, and you'll want to hear it over and over again. You're drawn right into the heart of this rousing track, as the Cambridge picks out all the dynamic subtleties to stir the senses.

Switch to the hip-hop beats of Eminem, and this

POWER OUTPUT The power rating tells you the claimed power output in watts per channel, using the RMS measurement. Don't accept this as an indication of quality or loudness, though. LINE LEVEL INPUTS This tells you how

many stereo phono inputs there are,

typically, around the back of your amp. Beware of amps with a small number if you have numerous components. TAPE LOOP These allow you to record out of your amp, and simultaneously monitor what's being recorded. PREAMP OUT Allows you to use the

preamp stage with a separate power amp **SPEAKERS** Some amps can drive two pairs of speakers, but not at high levels. TONE CONTROLS It has 'em, or it doesn't. **HEADPHONE OUTPUT** Lets you monitor the sound using a pair of headphones. **REMOTE CONTROL** It has one, or it doesn't.

LET'S KEEP THINGS short and sweet – the Cambridge wins at a canter. We haven't heard anything quite like it at this price before, and perhaps never will again. If you're after a mind-blowing all-rounder, it has to be the 640AV2.0.

However, if your budget is tighter, the NAD remains a fantastic alternative. It still manages to hold its own against some more expensive models.

The Qinpu lacks all-round ability, but it does have a certain appeal thanks to its open and detailed delivery.

That leaves us with the A300. Unfortunately, the Saxon struggles mainly due to the high quality of the opposition. If it weren't for that pesky Cambridge, then the A300's prospects would have been much brighter.
